



TASK FORCE CHARGE

The Task Force was charged with studying the following topics:

- Provision of care for seniors in the state of Kansas who suffer from Alzheimer's disease, dementia, and other age-related mental health conditions;
- Administration of anti-psychotic medications to adult care home residents;
- Safeguards to prevent abuse, neglect, and exploitation of seniors;
- Adult care home surveys and fines;

TASK FORCE CHARGE

Task Force topics, continued:

- Funding and implementing the Senior Care Act (SCA);
- Senior daycare resources; and
- Rebalancing of home and community-based services.

Final Task Force report due before 2023 Session.

2022 Legislative Priorities: Status Update

- 1. Fully funded nursing facility Medicaid reimbursement rates based upon cost report years 2019, 2020, 2021 and inflation factor through 12/31/22
- Read our <u>testimony</u> to House Social Service Budget Committee. House budget recs coming Monday, budget testimony on Senate side also on Monday.
- 2. Temporary Staffing Agency Reform
- HB 2524 passed favorably out of House Children and Seniors Committee 2/17. Amended the 150% cap on agency charges to 200% with a 1 year sunset. Further amended to add transparency language requiring agencies to report employee wage costs vs. Administrative costs and profits.
- **3. Restore use of temporary aides** HB 2477 signed by Governor Jan 21st. Temporary aides allowed for one year. There is a caveat for nursing homes who also need the matching federal waiver to stay in place to use temp aides.
- 4. Update and expand CNA training in Kansas
- SB 453 hearing held in Senate Public Health and Welfare. Fate will be decided this morning
- 5. Other important legislation
- HB 2652 extends pandemic liability protections for businesses, hospitals and adult care homes until Jan 20, 2023






What should I do with my legislators?
